AMERICAN SUN

An independently produced 60-minute documentary film, <u>Under the American Sun</u> (Camp Roxas Film Project), will trace the epic post-World War II migration of Filipino laborers to Guam.

The U.S. military recruited skilled laborers and professionals to help rebuild an island devastated by war, resulting in the initial 1946 influx of Filipinos to Guam. The recruitment process lasted for two decades, resulting in a migration of over 10,000 Filipino men and women to Guam.

Under the American Sun tells the story of Filipino immigrants to Guam, the llonggos from Iloilo Province, who arrived in 1946 at Camp Roxas in Agat, Guam, after World War II as part of the military reconstruction effort. Their arrival and settlement laid the foundation for four generations of llonggos to become Filipino-Americans and part of the Guam community.
